

This year, Simcoe's District Chamber of Commerce awarded its Citizen of the Year award to not just one outstanding Norfolk resident, but two. Upon hearing the news, the most surprised people were the recipients themselves, Karen and Doug Sibbett. The least surprised were probably their fellow volunteers at Norfolk General Hospital.

Doug took the phone call which informed him of the honour and couldn't believe it. Karen reacted in the same way, thinking that the award must have been meant for Doug alone. Anyone familiar with their work at NGH would never have doubted it for a moment.

When any volunteer association activity requires person-power, "Karen and Doug are always the first ones to call and ask 'How can we help?" says Drenise Cowlard, the association's Port Dover branch chair. Both Sibbetts have done her job in the past, and know all too well how many hands make light work. Port Dover has many special events which provide fundraising opportunities, but these often present special challenges. The Sibbetts have "provided an excellent shuttle service for volunteers in Port Dover on occasions when the roads downtown were closed to traffic," says Angela Grant, Delhi branch chair. "This meant they not only worked shifts themselves, but were available for the entire event period. They are always supportive and give so much of their time."

In past years, both Sibbetts have been key players in the volunteer association's annual fundraiser, Treasure Mart. From planning and organizing beforehand, to hauling and helping during, and even cleaning up afterwards, there isn't one aspect of the major event in which they have not been instrumental. Doug has especially enjoyed the atmosphere of working together with other members of the volunteer community and with business people. Both will miss the event; however, they wear many hats and participate in many other aspects of the volunteer association. Examples of their varied talents include Karen being the "baby-whisperer" during Grade One tours, and Doug being the driving force behind the overhaul of the gardens at both entrances of the hospital.

NGH is only one organization to benefit from their tireless efforts, however. When personal tragedy struck years ago, they were brought into the world of clowning by a friend and found that by lifting others' spirits, their own were lifted as well. They took the activity seriously, taking the Care Clowning Course and bringing fun to various nursing homes, parades and at the former Camp Trillium.

The Sibbetts came to Norfolk after their marriage 56 years ago, and began volunteering as a way to meet people. Their only connection to the area was through two of their relatives, but whenever and wherever they saw a need that they could fill, they stepped up. Karen notes that giving of themselves is incredibly rewarding, and that she feels she gets more than she gives. While Doug's mother was a patient at NGH, they saw that the coffee kiosk was understaffed, something that led them to their very first volunteer job in the hospital. "We saw the need, and NGH has done a lot for our family. This is our way to give back," notes Doug. He also mentions that his home town of Port Colborne has closed its local hospital, which reinforces his belief that supporting NGH is vitally important to Norfolk residents and that it deserves their support.

"Doug and Karen are more than just kind-hearted individuals; they are a team – a truly unstoppable duo whose shared passion and dedication are unmatched. They don't merely lend a helping hand; they offer their hearts, unwavering determination, resilience, leadership, and boundless compassion," says Kerri Emberlin, Director of Volunteer Services. "Their work is a testament to the power of selflessness and community spirit. Together, they embody the very essence of service, setting an example for all of us to follow. Whether through acts of kindness or leading meaningful initiatives, Doug and Karen make a lasting difference, achieving everything they set out to do and more."

# Personal Profile Marion's Journey Through Life and Love of Travel

She has crossed the Atlantic Ocean an astonishing 29 times and the Pacific once, with London, England, holding a special place in her heart—so much so that she has visited the city 19 times. Her passion for travel is more than just a hobby; it is a reflection of her curiosity and desire to experience the world in all its richness.

After training as a teacher in Toronto, Marion returned to her roots in Auburn, where she met her husband, Ron, when he was transferred to the local CIBC branch. Their life together was marked by a series of moves dictated by Ron's career, each bringing new challenges and opportunities. The couple welcomed their son while living in Dresden, Ontario, and their daughter in St. Catharines. These moves also saw Marion applying her skills in various roles, such as a Chargex rep (now VISA) in the Chatham-Windsor area, where she instructed merchants and expanded business networks, and later as a Mastercharge rep in Parkhill where she drove 400 miles a week setting up merchants in the London-Stratford areas.

Her dedication is evident in the over 2,000 hours of service she has contributed, a reflection of her love for meeting people and her commitment to giving back to the community.

Marion and Ron also cherished their winters in Tucson, where Marion engaged in her favorite hobbies—writing and square dancing, and knitting where she donated her creations to several charities. Her passion for writing is evident in the letters she pens to this day. She has had many pen pals from all over the world, including a close friend from Romford Essex, England, whose weekly correspondence has been eagerly anticipated for the past 34 years.

Through all her travels and experiences, Marion has distilled a simple yet profound piece of advice: "Travel while you can." Her life is a vibrant tapestry woven from the threads of family, work, volunteering, and a deep-seated love for exploring the world.

As communicated earlier, the result of the consolidation vote at the AGM on June 6<sup>th</sup>, 2024, was a 52/11 vote in favour of consolidation.

In September, a consolidation team was sponsored by the board. The branch chairs requested volunteer support to ensure that all branches were represented on the team. Volunteers came forward and a team was formed.

Team members Betty Lavallee and Jane Jarvis agreed to co-chair the team, with Betty Brooks, Angela Grant, Linda Novinka and Renee Owen representing the branches.

The team has been meeting weekly since early October. To manage the workload, the team divided the project into two phases:


**Phase 1** – Revise the top line structure and present a recommendation to the board at the scheduled November meeting. (This is complete, and the approved consolidation org chart is attached below). Next is to update the constitution and by-laws and present to the board at the scheduled December meeting.

**Phase 2** – Work the details, create/revise the position descriptions, and source interested volunteers for the new roles. Present overall plan to the board at the April board meeting. If approved, launch the new consolidation structure at the June 2025 AGM.



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# Introducing our new spiritual care intern: Support for patients, families, and now staff at NGH

At Norfolk General Hospital (NGH), we believe in caring for the whole person—body, mind, and spirit. That's why we're pleased to welcome Mikal Schomburg, our new Spiritual Care Intern, who is here to provide compassionate support not only for our patients and their families but also for you, our dedicated staff.

**Spiritual care** is a hospital service that provides support when health is changing, or when life feels out of balance. It's about helping people explore the values, beliefs, relationships, and practices that give meaning and purpose to their lives. Spiritual care helps individuals maintain a sense of self, even in the face of vulnerability and uncertainty that often come with the hospital experience. It's not just about religion—it's about connecting with what matters most to you.

Mikal brings nearly 20 years of experience in ministry, with eight years as an ordained minister. "I have spent many years walking with families and individuals as they face grief, loss, and the end of life," Mikal shares. "I discovered I have a gift for offering comfort and support during these times, and I felt a responsibility to deepen my skills. That's why I enrolled in a Pastoral Thanatology program at Tyndale University, focusing on grief, death, and dying. My goal is to become a certified grief counselor, equipped to help people through their most difficult moments."

Mikal's involvement with NGH began in 2016 when he moved to Simcoe and started volunteering as an oncall clergy member, available to patients by request. After COVID-19, he became more actively involved, joining the Spiritual Care team to provide additional support. His deep commitment to our community has led him to take on this internship, where he aims to expand spiritual care services to include staff as well.

#### Mikal's Role: Supporting Our Staff

While Mikal's primary focus is to meet with patients and families, he's also here to support our staff. We know healthcare work can be very rewarding but also emotionally challenging. Whether it's dealing with the loss of a patient, navigating a high-pressure situation, or simply feeling overwhelmed, these experiences can leave a lasting impact. Mikal is here to provide a safe space to talk and process these feelings.

"Our staff give so much care every day," Mikal says. "But they need care too. I'm here to listen, offer comfort, and help you find balance during tough moments."

#### Here is how Mikal can help

- **Private, confidential support**: Mikal is available for one-on-one conversations with staff, offering a safe and confidential space to share your thoughts and feelings.
- **Help after traumatic events**: If you've experienced a difficult or distressing situation, Mikal is here to listen and help you work through it. His support can help you cope better and feel less overwhelmed.

A listening ear: Sometimes, all you need is someone who will listen. Mikal is here to provide understanding and support after a rough day, helping you feel heard and valued.

Mikal is at NGH on Mondays and Fridays from mid-morning to mid-afternoon. You'll often find him in the chapel or walking through the hospital. Feel free to say hello or ask to speak with him if you need to talk. He's also available through the clergy on call list if you'd like to connect at a different time.

"I understand it can be hard for people to ask for help," Mikal says. "But I'm here for you, just as you're here for our patients. Even a brief conversation can make a big difference."

Mikal's internship at NGH runs until April of next year. During this time, he's focused on creating a framework for ongoing staff support at NGH. "I hope to leave behind a strong foundation for spiritual care for our staff," Mikal explains. "Even after my internship ends, the support can continue through the clergy on call program. Ultimately, I believe there's a need for a permanent chaplain role at NGH and NHNH, so this kind of care can be available long-term."

Taking time to care for your own well-being is important. By talking through your experiences, you can reduce stress, feel less overwhelmed, and even prevent burnout. Mikal's goal is to make sure you have someone to turn to when you need it most.


If you find yourself feeling overwhelmed or in need of support, we also want to remind you that the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) is here for you. This resource is available to all our staff, and physicians. You can reach out to a compassionate counselor by calling their toll-free helpline at 1-800-663-1142. This service offers confidential counseling, coaching, and support 24/7, 365 days a year.

Remember, you are not alone, and your well-being is important to us. Let's be there for each other, offer support, and help one another through these challenging times.

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#### CONFIDENTIALITY

As a volunteer, you are subject to the same code of ethics that applies to the staff. It is quite likely that you will see and hear things of a highly confidential nature.

- All information acquired through service in the hospital and nursing home shall be strictly confidential.
- No reference is to be made to the identity of any staff/patient, their admission to the hospital, their records, and/or their diagnosis or treatment, whether inside or outside the facilities.
- Do not seek information about a patient. Volunteers must never use their role to seek information or to gain access to restricted areas.
- The volunteer will not express an opinion on a patient's condition or treatment.
- Failure to adhere to the volunteer code of confidentiality could result in termination.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

Volunteering is a serious commitment. You have agreed to commit to a minimum requirement of time. Staff, patients, and residents depend upon volunteers to be present when they are scheduled.

Sign In / Sign Out:

Attendance is captured through the sign-in process called Vsys Kiosk, located in the volunteer lounge. The Vsys Kiosk is a touch-screen system that volunteers access with a four digit 'pin' number located on the front of your ID Badge. If your badge has a 'V' and three digits, use an '8' in place of the 'V'. The Vsys Kiosk allows volunteers to sign in at the beginning of their shifts and sign out at the end. The system is also used to pass along important information to you via messaging.

Off-site volunteer hours worked by every volunteer must be reported to Judy Boughner, either by the organizer of the event or the individual volunteer, but not both.

#### CONDUCT

A volunteer is a public relations representative and their conduct must create a positive image for Norfolk General Hospital, Norfolk Hospital Nursing Home and the Volunteer Association.

- Please keep voices low when performing duties.
   Avoid lengthy, personal conversation while on duty or in public areas of the hospital.
- Please do not carry out personal visiting with patients while on duty or in uniform. Generally, volunteers should not eat or drink in their area of service, public area, or hallways in the hospital.
- Do not chew gum while on duty.
- Cellular phones will not be used and will be turned off while in any patient area. Cell phones are allowed in designated areas only.
- Do not sit, lean or put anything on a patient's bed and do not help a patient or resident in any physical way unless you have been trained/instructed to do so.
- Avoid criticism of hospital staff and policy. If you have a concern/feedback, please bring it to the attention of the appropriate staff member.

- No institution is perfect and we must all strive to make improvements. Criticism of the staff may impact a patient's confidence and thus jeopardize treatment.
- Concerns must be brought to the attention of the Director of Volunteers or the President of the Volunteer Association.
- Do not accept tips or gratuities.
- All patients and residents are entitled to the same efficient, courteous care.
- If a patient should inquire about donating, the Hospital Foundation should always be suggested.
- Patients or residents may mistake a volunteer for a person in authority and ask advice. Volunteers will not give their advice and will refer the inquiry to the Director of the unit or the Clinical Practice Lead (CPL).
- While on duty, advantage should never be taken to secure professional medical advice for you or your family.
- The use of alcohol/cannabis products before coming to the hospital or nursing home is unacceptable.
